The aim of the week was to work on the core skills of resilience, team work and being able to cope when working out of our comfort zones. Pupils participated in activities such as gorge walking, nightline, jetty jump and campfire building. The main activity of the week was hiking into the mountains to a log cabin, spending the night in the log cabin and then hiking back out of the mountains the next day. All this was done whilst carrying all of their food, clothing and equipment in back packs! All pupils enjoyed the trip and were able to develop key skills that will help them on their return to school and their application in lessons.

#### NETBALL NEWS

In order to prepare for the upcoming Year 11 netball tournament in two weeks' time, the team had a friendly on Monday night against Archbishop Temple. Both teams had not played in a while. Unfortunately, we let this show more than Archbishop and this, together with the fact that we were a player down, resulted in us trailing by eight goals at the end of the first quarter. In the first interval, we made a few tactical changes and came out fighting in the second quarter, narrowly losing that by just two goals. Quarter three and four were much more positive. We were strong in defence. Angel Ojumobi and Millie Metcalf got numerous interceptions and we started to claw back at the early lead established by Archbishop. Ellie Moran played really well out of position at Wing Defence and marked her player tightly to make it difficult for her to get the ball. Lucy Brown and Faye Maguire shot consistently and worked the ball into the shooting circle thanks to some excellent dodging. Archbishop were under increasing pressure, and this started to show. We won the final quarter 9-5. Unfortunately, the early lead built up by Archbishop was just too great and the final score was 23-17. A great effort by all the players though. They never gave up and showed great resilience throughout. Well done girls. Great tournament preparation!

On Wednesday, 2 March the Preston Schools' netball tournament took place for the first time in three years. There were 25 teams participating and it was fantastic to finally see so many schools able to compete against each other again. We had three teams taking part, Year 7A and B teams and Year 8. There were only three schools that entered B teams and so Our Lady's once again had to face A teams for most of their matches. However, the girls did not let this deter them and they fought hard in all their matches, managing to draw three games. Year 7A and Year 8 won their league after very consistent and dominant performances over the five other teams in their section. Consequently, they both qualified for the semi-finals with the maximum 25 points. Year 7A found themselves facing the runners up of the other league, Longridge A, whilst Year 8 had to play Fulwood. Nerves unfortunately got the better of Year 7. They rushed a few passes, which resulted in Longridge gaining possession and taking an early lead. The girls showed great resilience and determination to try and claw back the score but couldn't quite manage it. A great effort and experience though and the team learned a lot from it. Year 8 had a convincing win over Fulwood and were thrilled to make it into the finals where they faced St Cecilia's. The girls have yet to play them in the league, so we were up against unfamiliar opponents. They were a very quick side, and this took us by surprise at the start of the game. St Cecilia's seemed a little more competitive and managed to take the first half. After a team talk to try and settle the nerves, Our Lady's started the second half positively. Unfortunately, luck wasn't going our way and we found it challenging to get the ball in the circle to our shooters to create scoring opportunities. On the final whistle, the score finished 5-1 to St Cecilia's. However, what a superb effort for the girls' first ever tournament experience.

In addition, some Year 9 and 10 pupils went along to help with the running of the tournament, and they were absolutely amazing and really contributed to the smooth running of the tournament. #### FOOTBALL NEWS

The Year 9 Football team made an excellent start in their quest for success in the Preston Schools' Cup competition with a convincing 5-0 win over Corpus Christi at the quarter-final stage. The two teams had met previously in the league with Our Lady's also winning that encounter. The game was played in cold and wet conditions, and it took around 20 minutes for both teams to settle and create good enough scoring opportunities. Liam Ronan was the player to break the deadlock with a fine individual strike from distance, sailing over the goalkeeper and into the roof of the net. A further 3 goals from team captain Bruce Leeming gave a comfortable lead before a fine team goal finished by Rhys Spickett completed the excellent display. The team are already looking forward to knowing who their semi-final opponents will be.

On Thursday, 3 March, the Year 8 football team travelled to Corpus Christi Catholic High School to play their firstround game of the Preston District Cup. From start to finish, it was a dominant display from Our Lady's. The team



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kept the ball well, showing composure and vision to find team-mates in space. Connor McCluskey had little to do in the first half, but he acted decisively and quickly when he needed to. Heidi Clark was solid as usual in the heart of defence and her distribution to players further afield was fantastic. Harrison Collinson maintained firm control of the midfield; with a pacey attacking trio of Lee Reed, Owen Inglis and Jake Watters, Our Lady's were always a threat. The team created a lot of chances throughout the game and players were clinical when they arrived. Jake Watters scored 4 and with many contributions from other players, the final score finished 10-0 to Our Lady's. They now progress to the next round where they face Archbishop Temple School.
