FOOTBALL NEWS

The Year 9 football team travelled to Clitheroe on Friday, 14 October to play Moorland School in the first round of the Lancashire Schools' competition. The team was in good spirits after an excellent win earlier in the week. The weather stayed dry for the fixture and the team began the game well, creating some chances but having to defend well against fast and skilful attackers from Moorland. The opposition was well drilled and used the width of the pitch nicely when in possession and they were soon in front after a strong counter attack led to a goal. Positive link up play between Harrison Collinson and Lee Reed helped to create numerous chances for Our Lady's and this combination lead to our first goal as Reed took a corner kick which was neatly found by the head of Collinson to bring Our Lady's back into the game. The team was always regularly under pressure in defence, simply due to the large size of the pitch allowing Moorland to keep spreading the play around. This extra space would help them into a 4-1 lead before Reed turned from provider into goal scorer with a neat strike from the edge of the penalty area to make it 4-2. Moorland added a fifth goal right at the end to leave the final result 5-2.

On Thursday evening, our Year 10 boys played Broughton in the District football league. The match was a strong, physical but fair event from the off with both sides keen to snatch the early advantage. A long throw from Daniel Cornall was met by Joe Summers who slotted the ball past the Broughton keeper. Following a quick counter attack resulting in an equaliser just before half time, the scores were level as the second half started, though the Our Lady's heads did not drop. With 10 minutes to go and light fading, a whipped in cross was met at the back post by the head of Harry Sumner. 2-1 victory and all the points going to the home team.
