BERLIN TRIP

During half term, 40 Year 9, 10 and 11 pupils travelled to Berlin for a History trip with links to the GCSE topics of the Superpower Relations and Weimar and Nazi Germany. We spent three days exploring the city, taking in all of the important historical sites as well as paying our respects at the Sachsenhausen memorial, Deportation memorial and the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe. All of these were very powerful, and pupils responded to them with the utmost respect. We embarked on a four-hour walking tour of the city, which included the Brandenburg Gate, Reichstag, Berlin Wall and Checkpoint Charlie. We ended the last evening with a visit to the roof terrace of the Reichstag where we had some wonderful views of the city all lit up for the evening. Pupils behaved brilliantly throughout and engaged with the rich history of the city.

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PARLIAMENT WORKSHOPS

Last Friday, Year 8 pupils all engaged in Parliament workshops. This gave pupils the opportunity to learn more about how democracy works as well as think about the biggest issues facing the UK and the world today. Pupils were sorted into groups to form political parties and create a manifesto which they then campaigned on. There were some brilliant ideas about the energy crisis, climate change and the prison reform. All pupils stood at the front and read their policies to their peers, which was lovely to see, as they clearly believed in the ideas that they had come up with as a team. Some pupils were given tricky questions to answer about their manifesto, but they rose to the challenge and delivered eloquent responses. Many pupils seem to have a genuine interest in making a difference locally and globally, the day helped everyone to reflect on how we can each make a difference.

FOOTBALL RESULTS

The Year 7 football team began their football experience with two first round Lancashire Cup matches against Corpus Christi and Archbishop Temple schools on Wednesday, 2 November. This was the first time pupils had played together and it was a great experience for all involved. The results may not have gone our way on this occasion, losing out to both Corpus Christi and Archbishop Temple and exiting the Lancashire Cup for this year.

The Year 11 team took on a talented Broughton High School side on Friday, 4 November. The game was held at Our Lady's which gave the team a slight advantage, playing in familiar surroundings. After a couple of previous losses, the team were prepared to work hard to gain the win they deserved, and they did not disappoint. Right from the start Our Lady's controlled the possession and were soon rewarded after Toby Atherton converted a chance from a corner kick. Broughton levelled the score 5 minute later but from that point onwards the Our Lady's defence was rock solid. Leighton Hewitt converted a penalty to take the lead. This was followed by a well taken long range strike from Toby Atherton and a free kick scored by Leighton Hewitt to seal the victory with a 4-1 score line. Player of the match was awarded to George Rainford. The team look forward to a trip to Rossall School in the Lancashire Cup later this month.

NETBALL NEWS

The Year 7 netball team had their first fixture against St Cecilia's last week. They have been training hard, listening and things have started to click into place.
