Prayer Theme Next Week: God's trust in us

The Gospel on Sunday is the Parable of the Tenants in the Vineyard (Matthew 21: 33-43).

"Listen to another parable: There was a landowner who planted a vineyard. He put a wall around it, dug a winepress in it and built a watchtower. Then he rented the vineyard to some farmers and moved to another place. When the harvest time approached, he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his fruit.

"The tenants seized his servants; they beat one, killed another, and stoned a third. Then he sent other servants to them, more than the first time, and the tenants treated them the same way. Last of all, he sent his son to them. 'They will respect my son,' he said.

"But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, 'This is the heir.Come, let's kill him and take his inheritance.' So they took him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him.

"Therefore, when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?"

"He will bring those wretches to a wretched end," they replied, "and he will rent the vineyard to other tenants, who will give him his share of the crop at harvest time."

Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures:

"The stone the builders rejected

has become the cornerstone;

the Lord has done this,

and it is marvelous in our eyes'?

"Therefore I tell you that the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.

Reflection

This is not a parable of forgiveness and love but of the truth of our faith. He calls us to bear fruit for the kingdom of God or it shall be taken from us, just like the tenants of the vineyard. In layman's terms, we have to do his will or risk never knowing the splendor of heaven. We are called to be perfection, though perfection is impossible. Our mission is to serve others and live as best we can.

Lord Jesus, your hands knew human labor, and you sanctified your life and the lives of those around you through your toil. Help me to see the virtue you teach. Help me to return all my talents to you by the work of my hands and mind. I want to be your working apostle.

Recruitment opens soon for our teacher training courses starting September 2024.

The Catholic Teaching Alliance, based at Our Lady's Catholic High School, is accepting applications for our 1 year PGCE with QTS (qualified teacher status) teacher training courses, to begin next September, 2024. Minimum requirements are GCSEs in Maths and English (and Science for primary training), plus an honours degree, class 2:2 or above.

Teacher training (PGCE with QTS) is available in all phases:

- Early Primary (3-7 years, in Preston)
- General Primary (5-11 years, in Preston)
- Secondary (11-16 years, in Preston or Blackburn)
- Secondary with post 16 (14-19 years, in Preston)

Careers Assemblies

This week's information assemblies have been careers based. Each year group listened to a talk followed by the opportunity to ask questions of various different employers.

On Monday Year 11 were spoken to by Elysee from Preston College. They discussed apprenticeships, T levels, scholarships, Preston College Ambassadors and the various different trade courses available. The pupils sat and listened attentively, gaining some valuable knowledge to help them make decisions about their futures.

On Tuesday we welcomed Simon Porter to talk to Year 9. Simon was in the army originally, then trained as a plumber/bathroom fitter. Simon now shares his knowledge and experiences with pupils at Preston College. Simon discussed all aspects of plumbing, gas certification and potential salary as an apprentice and owning your own company. Year 9 asked some wonderful questions at the end.



On Wednesday we welcomed former pupil Rebecca Clegg. Rebecca is a pharmacist, she discussed all aspect of pharmacy including medicine, dosage, clinical aspects, experience and qualifications needed. Rebecca then talked about different shift patterns and potential salary. Year 10 listened eagerly and asked some thought provoking questions at the end.

Vicky Haslam was our speaker on Thursday. Vicky is a neurological physiotherapist based at Royal Preston Hospital and a private clinic. She discussed the importance of wanting to help people in her profession and what a typical day looks like for her. Vicky discussed the importance of getting work experience in this field if it is something you are interested in. Year 8 asked a variety of questions including, "What has been your most difficult injury to deal with?"
