




Table Tennis Competition

On Wednesday teams of U13 and U16 pupils participated in the first round of the Preston Schools' Table Tennis competition. The results were mixed. Our Lady's U16 drew 4-4 with Corpus B team, but then narrowly missed out on a team win against Corpus A. Similarly, the U13s lost 5 games to 3 and 2 games to 1 against Archbishop Temple and Moor Park respectively. There were, however, some good individual wins for Judy Ellbbany, Charlotte Walker, Wiktoria Gronostajska, Emily Barnes and Emily Salisbury.



Attendance

Attendance remains a key focus for us as a school as we move into the new year. Our target for the end of the school year is 96%. Currently our whole school % attendance is below this figure, at 94% and with your support we hope to improve this as we move into the Spring Term. We are extremely pleased with the commitment our youngest pupils have shown and Year 7 lead the way - already reaching our whole school attendance target, with Year 9 holding the next highest % attendance.



In school we continue to ensure pupils are aware of the benefits of developing excellent attendance habits, and, how poor attendance affects various areas of school life, along with academic progress. We would ask that parents continue to raise the profile and the importance of excellent attendance. Year 11 Mock Interviews

On Monday 8 January, Year 11 pupils attended an information assembly about their upcoming mock interviews. Year 7 Futures Day

On Tuesday 9 January all of Year 7 participated in a Futures Day, using STEM subjects in real life practice. The pupils worked in small groups and were tasked with planning, making and testing various products for the challenges set. The pupils problem solved, used previous knowledge, and continuous trial and error to make their products the best they could. All pupils showed creativity, maturity, resilience, outstanding teamwork and skills. Their form tutors, along with Mrs Lin, Mr Robinson and Mrs Robinson, were very impressed with their final products and how closely they stuck to their task briefs.














The day finished with a talk for the whole year group from Mark Murray who works at BAE. He captured the pupils' attention with his knowledge of various planes including Nimrod and Tempest. In his time at BAE Mark has worked on some very exciting projects which he shared with our pupils. He talked about the importance of working really hard at school and never giving up, a really important quality when you are an engineer. Pupils asked lots of questions and they all learned some very interesting facts, including that it takes 1 second for a pilot to be ejected from a plane once they have pressed the button, staff and pupils were fascinated by this. The Sophie Scholl Awards

"Someone has to make a start." How about you?



Holocaust Memorial Day is commemorated each year on 27th January, the date of the liberation of the Nazi concentration camp Auschwitz-Birkenau in 1945. Holocaust Memorial Day remembers the millions of victims of the Nazi Holocaust, including six million Jews, and of other, more recent genocides.



The Sophie Scholl Awards were introduced at Runshaw as part of our events to commemorate Holocaust Memorial Day. The courage of Sophie Scholl, of a similar age to Runshaw students, was an inspiration to us all. We now extend an invitation to pupils in partner high schools to help us celebrate the short life of this brave young woman by participating in awards reserved for them.

Sophie was 18 when the war started in 1939. She and her family, inspired by their strong religious beliefs, actively resisted the Nazis – an incredibly courageous thing for Germans to do. In 1942, Sophie, along with her brother Hans and a few other students, founded the White Rose, a non-violent resistance movement which painted anti-fascist slogans on walls, defaced Nazi emblems and distributed anti-war leaflets. In early 1943, Sophie and the other leaders of the group were caught, condemned as traitors and executed by beheading. Sophie was just 21.

During her trial, despite the attempts of the judge and prosecutors to browbeat and ridicule her, Sophie remained steadfast as one individual against the massive power of the Nazi state. "Someone has to make a start", she said. Convinced that good in the end would prevail, her last words as she was led into the execution yard were, "The sun still shines!"

For many inspired by Sophie's example, a white rose has come to represent peace, justice and a love of humanity.

Students in partner high schools are asked to make an entry based on ONE of the following themes:

- (a) The inspiration of Sophie Scholl
- (b) The White Rose
- (c) Someone has to make a start

Entries can be

- a written piece (maximum 250 words but could be much shorter)
- a poem
- · a piece of art work or music of any kind
- an idea to do something at school based on Sophie's example
- anything at all based on one of the above themes.

Entries can be individual or group work.

Awards of vouchers and certificates will be awarded for the best entries.


