ENRICHMENT DAY 1

Year 7's Enrichment Day introduced the pupils to the culture and traditions of Tanzania. They experienced a variety of activities including learning about the History and Geography, Tanzanian Sports and Games, they learnt a little Swahili, made Maasai shield key rings and even got to meet some of the animals native to Tanzania. With this knowledge and understanding they wrote pen-pal letters enabling them to begin their relationship with the pupils of St Peter Claver School in Tanzania.

Year 8 took this quote as inspiration and sessions were based around asking the pupils to "Be the best version of you". The sessions were all practical and linked to pupils' own lives. All the year group watched a boy band in Session 1 and had a long discussion with them about how they can stay safe online and look out for others. In another session, pupils were taught CPR on dummies and how to help save a life if someone has a cardiac arrest in a real life situation. In the Drama studio, pupils were presented with moral dilemmas and some excellent lively discussions ensued. Advent calendars linked to pupils doing good deeds for others in school and at home were made and are now displayed in each form room ready for Advent. Liturgy preparation was built around using the talents God gave us to help others and beautiful coloured flames were produced with pupils thoughts and actions written on. These were then displayed in St Anthony's church where all the year group went lesson 5 for a lovely liturgy to end a great day.

Year 9 pupils were given the opportunity to explore topics connected to the theme of health and well-being. Sessions were delivered on the following areas: Drugs, Healthy Eating, Hygiene, Mental Health, Social well-being, The Media and Self-image.

Year 10 had their 'Faith in Action' Enrichment Day. The day began with looking at the parable of the sheep and the goats and understanding that we will be judged on how we have treated one another in our life on earth. Year 10 listened to a guest speaker who talked about his faith journey and how he puts his faith into action everyday; made prayer bracelets, created a campaign for an injustice they feel passionate about, peace workshop and reflected on the refugee crisis. All Year 10 were engaged and enthusiastic and got a lot out of the day.

Year 11 took part in our 'British Values' enrichment day. We were privileged to welcome Greg Dunnings from our armed services, who spoke to us about his experience in Afghanistan and how he has fought his way back from injury. He also ran our pupils through their paces using some team building skills; well done Form U who got very wet but never complained. We would also like to thank Adrian Murell from the Windrush initiative, who spoke to our pupils about his experience of race in modern Britain. Other sessions included 'what it means to be British', English justice system, Heroes and forming a parliament. The year group gathered together to complete a 'British values ' quiz. The winning team was team 3 from Form O, the winning form being Form R. Congratulations to all involved.
