A MESSAGE FROM MR RANSON - PE KIT AND LOCKERS

I have been asked by a parent whether it would be possible for pupils to wear their PE kit to school all day on the day where they have their PE lesson. I should like to share with you my response in the hope that it may help families to understand the situation better as, at first sight, this is a sensible suggestion.

As you can imagine, this is a matter of pros and cons. When considering mainly the problems associated with no locker and carrying the PE kit, the argument for wearing a PE kit to school for the day become quite compelling. The kit has our school badge, fewer bags to carry, removes changing room proximity. In addition, there would be time saving and therefore more curriculum time. There are however some strong counter arguments and the decision comes from balancing the two:

- Pupils sometimes get caught in a shower during outside lessons; this would mean that all pupils are in wet clothes all day unless they had a spare set at all times and there is still a need to change
- Sports on grass would need to be avoided in wet conditions to reduce the chance of pupils ruining their PE uniform for the day
- This could possibly further reduce our curriculum. An example is orienteering; an outdoor individual sport which is planning to be used after half-term. It is an ideal sport for the current situation. Yet pupils get very muddy and wet and would have to get changed either way
- As a consequence of avoiding being wet/muddy, lesson activities would be more suited to inside sports where guidance indicates to be outside where possible
- Girls have PE hoodies as part of their PE kit; this conflicts with the uniform policy if they were to be allowed to wear them around school. If not allowed to wear hoodies, a solution would be needed as they will be cold
- GCSE pupils still need to take part in sports such as football (under conditions) which needs to be filmed for their examination. Therefore, they will get wet/muddy, they will need to get changed
- We want to run extra-curricular clubs this year in bubbles; do they need to come in their kit as well?
- Pupils who do not come in their kit would need to get changed into spare kit; our teachers must supervise in the changing room for those pupils, while also having to look after those already changed
- The PE kit does not display the year group colour which is a vital tool in quickly assessing in which year group, and therefore which bubble a pupil belongs

Reference to 'other schools' is often made by people but they are not conclusive: each school is unique. Some schools have outdoor lockers for everyone so potentially they could easily have pupils still using lockers. Our lockers are spread throughout the school and are not placed in form rooms – with a few exceptions. It is the journey to

lockers that is the problem along with the congregating and cleaning requirements once used and the need for our one-way system. Access to lockers would cause serious time delays and require consistent additional supervision. The solution: each child carries their belongings. It is also the case that several schools where 'PE kit worn for the PE lesson day' was initiated in September have now stopped doing this, having encountered the very problems that are listed above. Some schools have fields with excellent drainage or have one of the large artificial surface games areas – frustratingly, we do not.

In light of all of these considerations, it remains our belief that the overall best strategy is to continue with pupils carrying their PE kit separately on the day of their PE class and maintain normal uniform each day. Along with so many others, I just long for a return to normality; every one of us is carrying additional burdens at present: some physical, some psychological, some emotional. This is one of the physical burdens that has fallen on our children, but we hope and pray that it will be temporary.
