

Preparing for Future Careers


Computer Science is not only about understanding technology that we have in our hands and pockets but it is also about using it to innovate and solve real-world problems. Without realising it, IT and Computer Science is relevant to everyone! When pupils think about jobs within the Computing sector, the main jobs pupils come up with are hackers, programmers, game and web developers and technicians. The aim of this year has been to open their eyes to other possibilities.



So far this year we have given opportunities to all classes and year groups.



We have competed in the *Faraday Challenge* which is a national science and engineering competition organised by the Faraday Institute for Science and Religion which is supported by the UK government. The aim of the Faraday Challenge was to inspiring young people to engage in hands-on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) projects. Not only was this a competition, it encouraged students to consider STEM careers and develop a passion for innovation.



Pupils have also had the opportunity to take part in the week-long Lancashire Cyber Festival.

The week allowed pupils to think about and be inspired by the potential cyber related career pathways that are available to them. This was to support the opening of the National Cyber Force Headquarters in Samlesbury. Cyber Security and the jobs this could provide for our pupils couldn't get any closer! It is important for pupils to understand that these opportunities are open to them right on their door step! Applications for GCHQ are open for the Cyber Specialist Development Program and our pupils need to know and be prepared for the future possibilities!

30 girls were also invited to CyberFirst MEGA Event which allowed the girls to access technology (including VR headsets, Spheros, robots, as well as using AI to generate images) The girls had a fantastic day and it has had a massive impact on the girls as they now, "Understand how it is all connected in the real world." Hopefully the day will have done as it needed to, to inspire and allow the girls to consider a future career in the sector.

Pupils took part in a virtual innovation live session where pupils could ask questions to professionals in the field of AI and Cybersecurity, including apprentices, working in ORACLE, the BBC as well as an expert who worked high up in cybersecurity whose identity needed to be kept a secret! It made pupils think more about what career prospects are in IT and Computer Science.





During National Careers week, pupils were given further insight into jobs that they may (and us!) didn't realise were possible! Pupils looked at how Art and Computer Science work incredibly well together.

Pupils looked into how marine NASA, biologists, Instagram, Microsoft, Google, cybersecurity companies use Computer Science and not in the obvious ways! Pupils were surprised in what can be achieved! Fingers crossed they will one day make it in ways they never knew.

There are more enrichment and career engaging activities coming up which will hopefully continue to motivate and inspire pupils, including Curry's, Raspberry Pi's, Manchester Airport!









We are running a competition to find the best writers of historical fiction in years 7, 8 or 9. There will be prizes in school and the best 5 will be entered into a national competition.

We would love as many people to enter as possible. To help you choose your story, think about the following:

- It must be Historically accurate even down to the choice of names which characters are given. Research is key! You might think it is a good idea to base your story around something you have studied in class.
- A riveting read with a good plot!

- character could have lived at the time?
- Use of historical knowledge
- Effective use of historical vocabulary. What are the key words they you might want to use to show how accurate your story is.
- Your entry must be between 400 words and 3500 words (but remember a long story is not always best!)

Entries must be received by Friday 16th May, but you can get your entries in earlier. Your work can be handwritten or typed.

Talk to your History teacher if you need any help to get you started.



All Year 8 pupils will be taking part in *The Entrepreneur* enterprise competition which will be launched in their Design & Technology lessons next week.

Pupils will be working in groups of three and will be given a £10 loan by OLCHS (repayable on 9th May - Forms O, U & R and 6th May - Forms L, A & D).

They must run enterprising activities - the Easter holidays will be good for this! - which will allow them to make as much profit from their loan as possible. All profit is to be kept and equally distributed within the groups.

Each group will make a short presentation (including photographic evidence) to their class about their activities and a winning team from each class will be selected.

The following rules must be adhered to:

- Pupils are not allowed to do the lottery or play the lottery.
- Pupils must not sell goods within school time under any circumstances. This includes selling sweets on the quad or yard at break or lunch.
- Pupils should refrain from cake sales and car washes, trying to be more creative with their ideas.
- All groups will be expected to pay the £10 loan back in full.
- The work that pupils do in their groups must be divided up equally between all three members. Profit must be shared out equally at the end of the activity.
- Groups MUST provide photographic evidence of their activity.



All year 7 pupils are taking part in the Chocotastic Challenge as part of their Design and Technology lessons. **Pupils will be expected to complete homework tasks related to the challenge which will be set by their class teacher.** The pupils are working in groups of three to design materials to promote a new healthy chocolate product. The tasks which each group must complete are:

- Design a fun mascot
- Design suitable packaging
- Design a leaflet / poster

Pupils may wish to consider other ways to promote their product too. Each group will then present their ideas to the rest of their class in lessons next week. Forms O, U & R will present on Friday 9th May and forms L, A & D on Thursday 8th May.

The presentations will involve pupils creating a PowerPoint presentation as well as a well rehearsed speech to deliver to their class. Groups may wish to make samples for their classmates to taste!




OLCHS pupils visited The Salvation Army this week to drop off our wonderful collection of Easter Eggs kindly donated by our school community.

PE DEPARTMENT - NEW PE KIT LAUNCH

Our Lady's Catholic High School PE Department have teamed up with Official Kit, Part of the Total Insignia Group as our sole PE uniform supplier as of September 2025.

From the start of the next academic year, we will be bringing in a totally new PE uniform which will be more suitable to the modern day PE student, **better value for money** and exactly the same for both genders. The new kit will be Joma branded which offers superb performance quality for sporting activities at a fraction of the cost of the current PE kit.

Our new suppliers, Official Kit, are a well established sports and school kit provider based in Blackburn and have partnerships with a number of local high schools already, as well as providing kit and equipment across professional sport working with the likes of Preston North End, Burnley FC, and the Ryder Cup. Orders will be **placed online** and shipped out to your home address making purchasing and replacing items of kit quicker and more convenient for our parents.

The new kit will consist of <u>three compulsory items</u>: Burgundy (badged) crew neck t-shirt, black shorts and black socks.

These items will need to be brought to all PE lessons across the year but there will also be additional, optional, items which you may wish to purchase for outdoor lessons across the winter months. These are a burgundy (badged) 1/4 zip jumper, a badged, black waterproof jacket and plain black, Joma tracksuit bottoms.

The new PE uniform will be **compulsory for all new Year 7 pupils** joining us in September 2025 however, pupils from other years will have the **option** to purchase and wear the new kit from September if they wish. Please be aware that the new PE kit will be compulsory for **All** students from **September 2026**.

Should you need to replace a PE kit in the final term, please do NOT feel you have to commit to buying the current PE uniform which will soon be discontinued. Please encourage your son/daughter to speak with their PE teacher who will be able to source some good quality items which can be used until the end of the academic year.

More information and confirmation of the webshop going live will be sent home via Synergy and published in the school letter in the coming months.

The Year 9 football team reached the final of the Preston Schools' Cup competition after a thrilling penalty shoot-out win over Archbishop Temple on Wednesday 2nd April. Our Lady's had struggled against this team in the past but started the game strongly. The wind played a huge factor in the game for both teams and it seemed to be helping the team playing into the wind. Our Lady's created a number of good chances with Mason D being very effective on the right win, getting past his defender and offering lots of crosses into the box. Though it was Archbishop Temple that scored first from a looping cross that made its way over the defence and into the back of the net, it was not long before Mikey S converted a header at the back post to make the score 1-1. Into the second half and it was looking like the game might be going into extra time, but the Mason D long range strike made it 2-1 to Our Lady's, but within minutes the scores were level again after an Archbishop headed goal made it 2-2. The game went into extra time and the two teams could not be separated, which meant that penalties were needed. After 5 penalties had been taken the scores were again level at 3-3 meaning sudden death. A miss from Archbishop Temple meant that it was down to Harry K to take the winning penalty, which he did extremely calmly, sending the goalkeeper the wrong way to begin the celebrations.

Arrive between 1000 and 1200 (at a time that suits you best) bring family. Parking will be at the entrance or inside the centre (pull up at the gate).
