The Theme Next Week: Luke 17:11-19 - Gratitude

Celebrating Black History Month in Form Time

As part of Black History Month, students will be hearing short, powerful stories from inspiring Black individuals during Form time. Each clip is designed to spark curiosity and interest.

12 of our Mathematicians attended a trip to Stonyhurst College for their "Much to do with Mathematics" event. During the day students explored the cross-curricular nature of Mathematics and were shown how it fits with many other areas of the curriculum.

Students took part in 4 activities:

- A visit to the Stonyhurst Historic Collections to view our Shakespeare First Folio and other artefacts of interest.
- A cross-curricular activity focusing on using Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics.

- The Stonyhurst Quiz a team quiz featuring rounds on Mathematics, Shakespeare, history and more.
- A talk by key-note speaker Rob Eastaway who spoke about his latest book "Much Ado About Numbers" which explores the Mathematics of Shakespeare's life and times.

OLCHS students were curious and active in their learning and displayed excellent teamwork, communication and mathematical skills throughout the day.

Three members of the Currys team from the Capitol Centre and Deepdale recently visited Our Lady's Year 9 class to discuss **online safety** and upcoming projects that our school will be involved with.

The Currys team explained how **eSafety** has evolved over the years. When the internet was "new" technology, the main threats were viruses that attacked devices and caused them to stop working. Today, threats are aimed more at users than devices. Pupils and visitors shared real-life examples, including a story about accidentally giving a grandmother a virus by downloading a free game. They also discussed online financial risks, highlighting how people can lose money without noticing, and the long-term impact this can have.



Cyberattacks on companies like Land Rover and Marks & Spencer were also discussed, showing that the effects extend beyond the immediate victims to factory workers, office staff, and suppliers. The session encouraged great participation from pupils, and Gracy P even received a copy of McAfee Antivirus, donated by Currys, to use on her personal devices.

During their visit, Currys also spoke about a recycling incentive that Darren and Miss Worthington have been developing.

They are exploring similar initiatives to those they have done with Chorley Football Club, with the potential for our school to become a blueprint for others nationwide.

Finally, the Currys team teased an upcoming Guinness World Record attempt that pupils will be invited to participate in.

Overall, the visit was exciting, informative, and inspiring, and the school is looking forward to seeing what happens next.


YEAR 11


