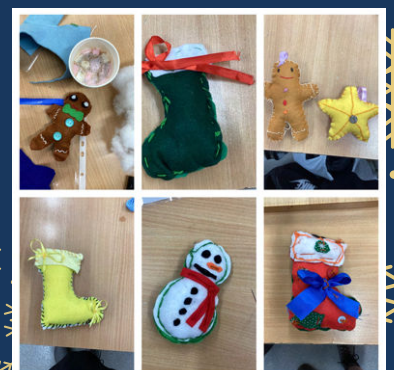


## Care Home Show

# ART WORKSHOP

This week in school, our 77 Year 10 GCSE Art students took part in an inspiring workshop with renowned artist Ian Murphy. Originally from Wigan, Ian travels the world recording the places and spaces he visits, producing textural, large-scale drawings and paintings detailing the sights and places he visits, which he sells as a practising artist.

During the workshop, Ian shared a fantastic range of his paintings, drawings and sketchbooks, explaining how he records his ideas and develops them into finished pieces. He then demonstrated a variety of techniques used within his own practice, which Year 10 students had the opportunity to explore for themselves. The outcomes were extremely impressive.

The work produced during the day will contribute towards the pupils' GCSE coursework, with the skills and ideas developed continuing to be refined as they progress through the course. The workshop was thoroughly enjoyed by all and will, we hope, remain a lasting and positive memory for our pupils long after they have completed their Art GCSE at Our Lady's.



## COMPUTER SCIENCE EDUCATION WEEK

Last week we celebrated Computer Science Education Week. Each day on Padlet, pupils were introduced to or reminded of some of the key pioneers within Computer Science. On Monday, pupils were introduced to Grace Hopper, a pioneering computer scientist and U.S. Navy rear admiral, best known for her work on early programming languages and for helping to develop COBOL. Her work helped make programming more accessible and laid important foundations for modern computing. This is why the week beginning 9th December is chosen, as it marks her birthday.

Other pioneers included Katherine Johnson, who worked at NASA and played a critical role in the Apollo 11 Moon landing mission; Alan Turing, who helped crack enemy codes during World War II; Tim Berners-Lee, who developed the World Wide Web; and Ada Lovelace, widely regarded as the world's first computer programmer.

During this week, pupils were also invited to take part in a Cyber Security task, where codes had to be cracked to stop the "school system" from being breached. Well done to Ajit S (100), who successfully stopped the cyber-attack. Prizes will be on their way to you!





## Christmas Challenge 2025

On Wednesday 10th December, classes in Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 Computer Science took part in the annual GCHQ Christmas Challenge.

Pupils were set seven puzzles, each designed to test a wide range of skills, including:

- Code-breaking
- Mathematical reasoning
- Analytical thinking
- Lateral thinking and creativity
- Logic and problem solving

These challenges reflect the types of thinking used in real intelligence and cybersecurity work at GCHQ.

Working in small teams, pupils combined their different strengths and approaches to crack each puzzle – just like real codebreakers. Once they had solved the questions, they used their answers to uncover a **secret festive message**.

Second place went to **Teckers**, made up of Bree-Anna (8O), Ayona T (8L), Pricilla A (8A) and Neva T (8L).

Close behind in third place were **Trustworthy Achievers**: Zofia P (8D), Anna S (8D), Lyla M (8D) and Fearne B (8D). **Fierce Rangers**, represented by Anna A (8A) and Khadija M (8R), also put in a strong effort throughout the competition.

Although the teams did not place in the national rankings, the event was an excellent experience for all involved, and plenty of fun was had along the way.

They provide qualifications (like Level 2/3 Diplomas), real-world work experience, and opportunities to play competitively, helping young athletes develop both on and off the pitch.
